Village Manager Report

- There were two large water breaks in the past couple of weeks. One was at 5565 Lytle Road and the other was in the 900 block of Franklin. This was a good learning experience for the Water Department to understand what valves need to be shut down during breaks. Once the rain stops, they will restore the areas.
- Council will be voting tonight to approve the 2024 tax budget.
- There is also an ordinance to enter into a cooperative agreement with Wayne Township for an OPWC grant application for the repaving of Corwin Road. Part of this road is within Village limits.
- The Little Miami Leadership Float sponsored by Warren County Soil and Water is on July 26th, Council will need to RSVP by July 14th to participate.
- Michael Spicer of Moody's should begin digging Well 10 on July 5. The preliminary drawings for the easement with Harvest Baptist Church for the water line from the new well to connect to the lines from Wells 6 & 7 have been completed.
- Fed Excavating has completed the road from Bowman Park to Well 10 and they did a great job.
- Details for the OPWC projects have been provided in the Village Manager's report for Third, Franklin Phase I and II. Planning to apply for Fourth Street to be the next OPWC project for 2025.
- Strawser will begin the micro-surfacing project on June 28. They will put up no parking signs and hand out letters to residents two days before the project begins. A list of streets has been provided in the report.
- The Maintenance Department cleaned up brush and debris behind the Government Building.
- A Public Hearing of Council is scheduled for July 17 for Council to consider the rezoning of 407 High Street from R4 to SO.

Police Report

- Officers are prepared and scheduled for the parade, bike rodeo, and fireworks.
- The Warren County Victim Advocates has recently created and implemented a new portal system to report crimes against victims. This is in collaboration with the Ohio Attorney General's Office. This will allow officers to enter reports to help victims maintain privacy, provide safety, and offer assistance with any legal proceedings. Waynesville Police Department was the first agency in Warren County to use the new system. Officer Jim Walker did a great job inputting the

- report into the new portal and has received accolades for his exemplary execution of the new system.
- Everything has been ordered to get the new cruiser into service.
- The firing range has been scheduled for August 20 for the officers to qualify for the required state-certified qualification.

Chief Copeland explained that back in 2021, the Village of Waynesville was not approved to receive funding for the Third Street project from the OPWC Board for PY35. The Village did not receive enough points. Chief Copeland stated he then applied for several other grants to fund the project of repaving and new water lines on Third Street. He related that he had just received word that the Village was awarded an Ohio Department of Development grant in the amount of \$499,750. The State DOD grant will be combined with the Ohio Public Works PY36 grant to replace the waterlines and repave Third Street. The two grants combined total \$999,243.00 and the entire project will be funded with little to no cost to the residents of Waynesville.

Chief Copeland also stated that he just received word from Warren County that they will be donating a cage to Waynesville Police Department for the new cruiser. Additionally, the radio that came with the vehicle can be reprogrammed and reused. Further saving the taxpayers money.

Law Report

- Council met in July and finalized two charter amendment issues to be placed on the ballot. Ordinances for these will have the first reading on July 17 and possible adoption on August 7. This will leave plenty of time to get these to the Board of Elections in time to be placed on the November 2023 ballot.

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New Business

Ms. Dedden stated that the Finance Committee has discussed the best way for Council to promote the replacement police levy that will be on the ballot in November. She read from the May 18, 2023, Finance Committee minutes "The Police Levy Fund is lessening after adding an extra officer and raises. In 2021 the fund started with a balance of 463K and 2024 is projected to start off with a 256K balance. There was a buildup from previous years and that is slowly being depleted. Currently, two officers and part of Chief's salary are being taken out of the General Fund. The Levy needs to pass to be able to maintain the Police Levy Fund." Ms. Dedden said this sums up why it is so important to the Village finances to have a replacement levy pass.

Ms. Dedden asked Mr. Forbes what Council can and cannot do to promote a levy. Mr. Forbes stated that Council is not allowed to spend public funds or take any position on ballot issues. The Village can provide factual and educational information on ballot issues but cannot advocate one way or the other. All funding will have to come from an independent Political Action Committee, of which Ron James is currently the Finance Director. Chief Copeland suggested putting an article together for the Township Newsletter providing information about the levy and the importance of the Police Department. He asked if there were any Council members that would be willing to write the article for the fall newsletter. Ms. Dedden and Mrs. Miller volunteered to write the article.

It was stated that it would cost the residents \$245 per \$100,000 of the estimated home value for the replacement levy. Ms. Dedden suggested Council have a special meeting and invite the community to inform them of upcoming ballot issues which include the Police Levy Replacement and the proposed charter amendments. Council decided to cancel the Public Works meeting on October 2, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. and schedule the Special Council Meeting for October 2, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. Ms. Dedden asked that the information for the ballot issue informational meeting be placed on the September and October water bills.

WHEREAS, the Council for the Village of Waynesville has the authority to submit proposed
amendments to the Charter of the Village of Waynesville to the electorate; and
WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Village Council to submit such amendments to the electors of the
Village.
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the Village of Waynesville, Ohio,
members elected thereto concurring:
Section 1. That the following revision to the Charter of the Village of Waynesville, attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference, shall be submitted to the electors of the Village of Waynesville at the general election to be held on the 7 th day of November, 2023, at the regular places of voting in said Village as established by the Board of Elections:
Section 2. That the Clerk of Council is hereby directed to certify a copy of this Ordinance to the Board or Elections of Warren County, Ohio, and the Clerk is directed to provide notice of the proposed Charter revision to the electors of the Village as required by law.
Section 3. That this Ordinance provides for the submission of a question to the electorate and shall be effective immediately upon its passage pursuant to Section 4.08 of the Village of Waynesville Charter.

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EXHIBIT A

PROPOSED CHARTER REVISION

VILLAGE OF WAYNESVILLE

A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.

Shall various sections of the Village of Waynesville Charter be revised to read as follows:

SECTION 3.01 MAYOR.

-(D) In the event of a vacancy in the office of Mayor whereby the President pro tempore is required to serve as Mayor.

SECTION 3.05 VACANCIES, FORFEITURE OF OFFICE, AND FILLING OF VACANCIES.

(D) Filling of Vacancies. Vacancies in the office of Council member shall be filled within forty-five days by an affirmative vote of at least four of the remaining members of Council. If a vacancy occurs in one or more positions among Council members, Council of the new term shall appoint, by an affirmative vote of at least four members, an eligible citizen of the Municipality of Waynesville. Unsuccessful candidates for Council from the previous election, who are interested in the vacancy, should-be given first consideration before any other applicants are considered. If none of these unsuccessful-candidates is selected-Council shall then make the appointment from the other qualified applicants. If the Council fails to do so within forty-five days following the occurrence of the vacancy, the power of Council to fill the vacancy shall lapse and the Mayor shall fill the vacancy by appointment at the next regularly scheduled Council meeting following the expiration of the said forty-five days. Unsuccessful candidates for Council from the previous election, who are interested in the vacancy, should be given first consideration-before any other applicants are considered. If none of these unsuccessful candidates is selected then the Mayor shall make the appointment from the other qualified applicants. The person so appointed shall serve until the next Municipal election occurring not less that ninety days thereafter at which time a successor shall be elected for the remainder of the unexpired term.

SECTION 3.07 ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS.

(A) Following each regular municipal election, the Council shall meet not later than the seventh day of January for the purpose of organizing. At such meeting, the newly elected members of Council shall take the oath of office and the Council may transact such other business as may come before it. Thereafter, regular meetings shall be held as prescribed by ordinance, but not less frequently than twice each month.

- (B) All meetings of Council shall be open to the public, except, that the Council may by a majority vote of the members present eneter into an executive session only for those purposes allowed by the general laws of the State of Ohio. Except as provided under the laws of the State of Ohio, Section 121.22 and commonly referred to as the "Sunshine Law," all meetings of the Council shall be open to the public. A majority of the members of Council shall constitute a quorum at all meetings.
- -(C) Exceptions to the open meeting requirement are:
- (1) To consider the appointment, employment, dismissal, discipline, promotion, demotion, or compensation of a public employee or official, or the investigation of charges or complaints against a public employee, official, licensee or regulated individual.
- (2) To consider the purchase of property for public purposes, or the sale of property for public purposes or for the sale of property at competitive bidding, if premature disclosure of information would give an unfair advantage to a person whose personal, private interest is adverse to the general public interest.
- (3) To confer with an attorney for the public body, concerning disputes involving the public body that are the subject of pending or imminent court action.
- (4) To prepare for, conduct, or review negotiations or bargaining sessions with public employees concerning their compensation or other terms and conditions of their employment.
- (5) To consider matters required to be kept confidential by federal law or rules or state statutes.
- (6)—To review specialized details of security arrangements where disclosure of matters discussed might reveal information that could be used for the purpose of committing or avoiding prosecution for a violation of the law.

SECTION 4.16 POSTING AND PUBLICATION OF ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

(A) The Clerk of Council shall cause each ordinance and resolution adopted to be published by posting a copy of the ordinance or resolution in the place in the Municipality as determined by the Council, for a period of fifteen days at the Municipal building and four other conspicuous places frequented by the public.

SECTION 5.01 APPOINTMENT, QUALIFICATIONS AND COMPENSATION.

(A) The Manager shall be appointed by an affirmative vote of at least five members of Council. The Manager shall be appointed solely on the basis of executive and administrative qualifications. The Manager need not be a resident of the Municipality at the time of the appointment, but must reside within the Municipality while in office or within a twenty minute drive time with approval by an affirmative vote of at least four members of Council.

SECTION 5.04 POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE MANAGER.

- (E) The Manager shall prepare and submit the annual budget, appropriation ordinance and capital program to the Council.
- (1) Capital program submission to Council. The Manager shall prepare and submit to the Council a five year capital program at least one month prior to the final date for submission of the budget to the Council.
 - (2) Contents. The capital program shall include the following:
 - (a) A clear, general summary of its contents.
- (b) A list of all capital improvements which are proposed to be undertaken during the five fiscal years next ensuing, with appropriate supporting information as to the necessity for such improvements.
- (c) The cost estimates, methods of financing and recommended time schedules for each improvement.
- (d) The estimated annual cost of operating and maintaining the facilities to be constructed or acquired.

The above information may be revised by the Manager and extended each year with regard to capital improvements still pending or in process of construction or acquisition.

- (3) Adoption by Council. The Council by resolution, shall adopt the capital program with or without amendment prior to adoption of the budget.
- (4) Council shall be responsible for organizing the special notification of Village residents of a hearing at which Council shall advise the village residents of the scope and detail of any and all capital projects in excess of \$250,000.00\$\frac{2,000,000.00}{2,000,000.00}\$. The purchase of real estate is exempted from the above hearing. The hearing shall be held in a timely manner relative to the planning of the above capital projects. The purpose of this hearing is to better inform the Village residents regarding any suggested or planned major capital projects and to inform Council of the "Opinion of the Village" on the matter. Council shall be prepared to cover the following in this meeting.
 - (a) General scope and detail of the project.
 - (b) Total estimated cost.
 - (c) Time frame for completion.
 - (d) Funding plans and impact on taxes.

The hearing shall be advertised at four prominent locations around the village at least forty eight hours prior to the meeting. It shall in addition be advertised in a short presentation to be included with a Waynesville water bill. This short presentation shall cover points 1-4 above.

SECTION 7.07 PARKS AND RECREATION BOARD — MEMBERSHIP.

There shall be a Board of Parks and Recreation consisting of five members, three of whom are appointed by Council, two of whom shall be members of Council appointed for a term of one year, and two citizen members, as well as one member appointed by the Board of Education to serve four year overlapping terms of office.

SECTION 8.01 NOMINATIONS.

(A) Nominations for members of Council shall be made only by petition signed by at least twenty-five qualified electors of the Municipality. Such a petition shall be accompanied by a declaration of candidacy and shall be filed with the election authorities no later than 4:00 pm of the seventy-fifth ninetieth day before the date of the regular Municipal election.

All other provisions of the Charter not specifically revised herein shall remain in full force and effect.







• The 2023 Independence Day Parade was another success and had a great turnout. I have provided photos of the event for your review.

- In 2021, I submitted a BUILDS (Broadband, Utilities, and Infrastructure for Local Development Success) grant application to the Ohio Governor's Office which is for water infrastructure improvements in the amount of \$500,000.00 for the 3rd Street waterline and repaving project. This project was already awarded an OPWC (Ohio Public Works Commission) grant that I submitted in 2022 in the amount of \$499,243.00. The OPWC grant was a Village match grant of 41%. On June 16th, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine approved the BUILDS grant and the Village was awarded the \$500,000.00 grant funds. The combination of the OPWC and BUILDS grants will cover 100% of the 3rd Street waterline replacement and repaving project estimated at \$999,243.00 and should create no cost to the Village or taxpayers. I have included a copy of the press release that I submitted to the Dayton Daily News for your review.
- After the East Palestine, Ohio train derailment and contaminant spill, the Village took immediate action to ensure that our water quality was not affected. We have always done bacteria sampling and water quality testing as required by the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency). The Village took additional measures to guarantee the public that our water quality was not compromised. In March following the East Palestine event, the EPA required all water distribution agencies to do a UCMR5 test twice a year. We completed the UCMR5 test on March 14th, which includes a PFAS and lithium testing. What is UCMR5? The fifth Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule (UCMR5) requires monitoring for 29 polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) compounds and a single metal analyte, Lithium. PFAS are a group of man-made chemicals that includes PFOA, PFOS, GenX and many others. These substances have been manufactured and used in a variety of industries across the globe, including the United States, since the 1940s. In addition, we did an independent test on March 13th with ETR Laboratories that included a vinyl chloride scan which is the contaminant chemical at the East Palestine, Ohio spill along with several other types of VOC's. On July 6th, we received the results of the UCMR 5 tests, which stated that the Village water supply was not affected by the East Palestine spill and is of high-quality drinking water. I have provided a copy of all the results for your review.







On June 14th the Water Department located a valve that was leaking on North Street near Main Street. They changed the valve while the line was still active, so they would not have to shut off the water for the merchants and residents in the area. The valve has been repaired and is working properly with no leaks. Below are photos of the live waterline valve being repaired.



• Brian and Greg of the Maintenance Department have started to paint curbs with the new paint machine. Weather permitting, they will be painting curbs around the Village over the next few weeks. The photos below are the curbs in the school zone.



• The Council will be voting on an ordinance to accept the utility easement from well #10 across Harvest Baptist property to our water feed line at the Village wellfield.

• A subsequent investigation of the old meters at the bulk water distribution station (Sawyer Building) revealed that the meters were inaccurate. Below you will see Brian and Steven of the Water Department changed meters, which now show accurate readings.







• The streets listed below received a microsurface on June 28th - 30th. The microsurface can best be described by saying it is like the spray lining of a truck bed. The microsurface is a lining on the street to prolong the life of the street from cracks and potholes.

• The Council will be voting on an ordinance to accept SmithCorp's bid for the 3rd Street water main and resurface project. Choice One Engineering recommends to accept the bid.

- On July 5th Jerry Hoffmann dropped off a property exemption letter that he received from the United States Army Corps of Engineers regarding his property on the corner of SR42 and SR73. I am providing you with a copy and he advised that based on the Stantec Engineer study, he is moving forward on filling in the property for a future business.
- The Maintenance staff used the new hydrovac to clean out several storm water basins in the Village. In addition, the hydro jet powerwasher on the hydrovac was used to clear out several clogged stormwater lines, which opened up a better flow for storm water.



- Archer Energy was awarded the contract as the natural gas aggregate for the Village at a rate of \$0.5699 per Ccf. This agreement is from August 2023 May 2025. Residents were mailed the information about the program and how to opt out of if they choose to. A copy of the mailer has been attached with this report.
- I have spoken with Michael Spicer of Moody's Construction and he advised that they will mobilize their equipment to the Well #10 site location on July 17th and begin drilling on July 18th. The project will be completed that week and they will be scheduling a date to run the connecting waterline when the easement is completed and filed with the County.

- Officer Mermann, Sgt Denlinger and I worked the bike rodeo at Bicentennial Park on Saturday, July 1st following the parade. The event went very well and 90 bike helmets were given out to children. Waynesville Receives \$499,750.00 State Grant for Critical Water Infrastructure Upgrades

(COLUMBUS, Ohio) — Waynesville is one of 70 projects receiving state grants to address critical water and wastewater infrastructure projects in Ohio communities. In total, 58 counties will receive more than \$114 million.

The funding comes from Governor DeWine's Ohio BUILDS (Broadband, Utilities, and Infrastructure for Local Development Success) water infrastructure grant program, administered through the Ohio Department of Development.

Today's award will support Waynesville with the Third street waterline replacement and repaving project.

"Ohio is the heart of opportunity, and for our state to continue to thrive, we must ensure that more communities have steady access to reliable, clean water," said Governor DeWine. "My administration is committed to supporting as many local communities as possible with water projects that will improve quality of life and give residents more opportunities to live up to their God-given potential."

Today's announcement is the fourth round awarded through the program, which opened in July 2021. In total, more than \$360 million has been awarded to 253 critical infrastructure projects through the Ohio BUILDS water infrastructure grant program.

This State DOD grant will be combined with the Ohio Public Works PY36 grant to replace the waterlines and repave Third Street. The two grants combined total \$999,243.00 and the entire project will be funded with little to no cost to the residents of Waynesville.

"At Development, we're working to build strong communities so that when people come to our state, we have the infrastructure and amenities to support them," said Lydia Mihalik, director of Development. "We're grateful to the Ohio legislature for additional funding to make these critical investments and help prepare our communities for continued growth."

In total, the program received more than 1,200 grant applications requesting nearly \$1.4 billion in funding.

Funds awarded today will help reduce or eliminate the local financial burden associated with critical infrastructure needs such as the construction of new water systems, the replacement of aging water lines, and the installation of new water mains. Grants will also fund projects to prevent sewer system backups and replace failing household sewage treatment systems with new sewers.

This grant helps the Village achieve our goal of replacing all the older waterlines in the Village.

The Ohio BUILDS water infrastructure grants are a continuation of Governor DeWine's H2Ohio initiative, which launched in 2019 to focus on ensuring plentiful, clean, and safe water for communities across the state.

Ohio BUILDS focuses not only on strengthening Ohio's communities through water infrastructure upgrades, but also supports other necessary investments in targeted solutions that impact quality of life such as broadband expansion, brownfield redevelopment, the demolition of blighted buildings, and more.

CWSs may include their public notice within CCRs, also known as annual drinking water quality reports, which are to be delivered to all billing customers each year by July 1. CWSs must report the average and range of the year's monitoring results. PWSs are responsible for being aware of and complying with their State's requirements, if any.

Results in SDWARS will ultimately be released to the public (approximately quarterly) via EPA's <u>UCMR Occurrence Data webpage</u> and <u>National Contaminant Occurrence Database</u> (NCOD).

I refer to the information received in this office on January 6, 2023, concerning the *Jerry Hoffmann Farm Road Project*. You have requested the United States Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) review your proposal for possible Department of the Army (DA) permit requirements. The proposed project site is located in Waynesville, Warren County, Ohio (39.525882 latitude, -84.086219 longitude). Your request has been assigned the following file number: LRH-2023-35-LMR-Mill Run. Please reference this file number on all future correspondence related to the subject proposal.

The Corps' authority to regulate waters of the United States is based on the definitions and limits of jurisdiction contained in 33 CFR Part 328, and 33 CFR Part 329. Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (Section 404) requires a DA permit be obtained prior to discharging dredged and/or fill material into waters of the United States, including wetlands. Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (Section 10) requires a DA permit be obtained for any work in, on, over or under a navigable water.

Based on a review of the information provided, the *Jerry Hoffmann Farm Road Project* will involve the construction of one (1) farm road to access an active agricultural field. The project will result in the discharge of fill material below the ordinary highwater mark of 20 linear feet of one (1) perennial stream (Mill Run) at one (1) location in association with the construction of one (1) stream crossing.

We have determined your proposal meets the exemption defined under 33 CFR § 323.4(a)(6). Therefore, no DA permit is required from this office for the proposed activity; however, the farm road must be constructed and maintained in accordance with best management practices (BMPs) to assure that flow and circulation patterns and chemical and biological characteristics of waters of the United States are not impaired, that the reach of the waters of the United States is not reduced, and that any adverse effect on the aquatic environment will be otherwise minimized. These BMPs which must be applied to satisfy this provision shall include those detailed BMPs described in the State's approved program description pursuant to the requirements of 40 CFR § 233.22(i), and shall also include the baseline provisions noted at 33 CFR § 323.4(a)6(i)-(xv) (See Enclosure 1). Additionally, the discharge of dredged or fill material must comply with 33 CFR § 323.4(b) and (c) (See Enclosure 1).

This letter does not excuse you from the obligation to obtain any other federal, state and/or local authorization, if required. You should not commence work until you receive the required authorizations. In addition, this letter does not grant any property rights or exclusive privileges, or authorize any injury to the property or rights of others. If you contemplate any changes or additional activities from those described in the information received on January 6, 2023, please submit them to this office for authorization review prior to construction.

Enclosure 1

- (i) Permanent roads (for farming or forestry activities), temporary access roads (for mining, forestry, or farm purposes) and skid trails (for logging) in waters of the U.S. shall be held to the minimum feasible number, width, and total length consistent with the purpose of specific farming, silvicultural or mining operations, and local topographic and climatic conditions;
- (ii) All roads, temporary or permanent, shall be located sufficiently far from streams or other water bodies (except for portions of such roads which must cross water bodies) to minimize discharges of dredged or fill material into waters of the U.S.;
- (iii) The road fill shall be bridged, culverted, or otherwise designed to prevent the restriction of expected flood flows;
- (iv) The fill shall be properly stabilized and maintained during and following construction to prevent erosion;
- (v) Discharges of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States to construct a road fill shall be made in a manner that minimizes the encroachment of trucks, tractors, bulldozers, or other heavy equipment within waters of the United States (including adjacent wetlands) that lie outside the lateral boundaries of the fill itself;
- (vi) In designing, constructing, and maintaining roads, vegetative disturbance in the waters of the U.S. shall be kept to a minimum;
- (vii) The design, construction and maintenance of the road crossing shall not disrupt the migration or other movement of those species of aquatic life inhabiting the water body;
- (viii) Borrow material shall be taken from upland sources whenever feasible;
- (ix) The discharge shall not take, or jeopardize the continued existence of, a threatened or endangered species as defined under the Endangered Species Act, or adversely modify or destroy the critical habitat of such species;
- (x) Discharges into breeding and nesting areas for migratory waterfowl, spawning areas, and wetlands shall be avoided if practical alternatives exist;
- (xi) The discharge shall not be located in the proximity of a public water supply intake;
- (xii) The discharge shall not occur in areas of concentrated shellfish production;
- (xiii) The discharge shall not occur in a component of the National Wild and Scenic River System;
- (xiv) The discharge of material shall consist of suitable material free from toxic pollutants in toxic amounts; and

- (xv) All temporary fills shall be removed in their entirety and the area restored to its original elevation.
- (b) If any discharge of dredged or fill material resulting from the activities listed in <u>paragraphs (a)</u> (1) through (6) of this section contains any toxic pollutant listed under section 307 of the CWA such discharge shall be subject to any applicable toxic effluent standard or prohibition, and shall require a section 404 permit.
- (c) Any discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States incidental to any of the activities identified in paragraphs (a) (1) through (6) of this section must have a permit if it is part of an activity whose purpose is to convert an area of the waters of the United States into a use to which it was not previously subject, where the flow or circulation of waters of the United States may be impaired or the reach of such waters reduced. Where the proposed discharge will result in significant discernible alterations to flow or circulation, the presumption is that flow or circulation may be impaired by such alteration. For example, a permit will be required for the conversion of a cypress swamp to some other use or the conversion of a wetland from silvicultural to agricultural use when there is a discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States in conjunction with construction of dikes, drainage ditches or other works or structures used to effect such conversion. A conversion of a section 404 wetland to a non-wetland is a change in use of an area of waters of the United States. A discharge which elevates the bottom of waters of the United States without converting it to dry land does not thereby reduce the reach of, but may alter the flow or circulation of, waters of the United States.

Municipal Aggregation Commonly Asked Questions

What is Municipal Aggregation?

Municipal Aggregations are when a group of customers or entire communities join together to combine their purchasing power. The process of aggregation can generate products for communities that are more favorable than an individual customer could achieve.

Who is Archer Energy?

Archer Energy is a leading retail supplier of electricity and natural gas and is licensed by the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio and approved by the utility.

What is the aggregation program rate?

The aggregation rate and term can be found on the offering as well as the attached terms and conditions.

Will I receive a separate bill from Archer?

No, the utility will continue to bill you for its services as well as Archer's service. You will pay the utility and the utility will remit our portion to us.

How do I enroll?

Eligible residential or business customers will be automatically enrolled in the program subject to certain restrictions.

What does it mean to opt out of the program?

Opting out means that you do not want to participate in the program established by your community leaders. If you opt out you will not be enrolled in this program.

Who is eligible to participate?

Most businesses and residential customers located in the municipality are eligible.

Who would not be automatically eligible to participate?

Customers enrolled in the Percentage of Income Payment Program (PIPP), a customer who is under contract with another supplier or a mercantile customer are not automatically eligible to participate. If you would like to join the program, please contact our office to discuss.

Are there any additional fees for participating in the program?

No. There are no switching fees imposed by the utilities to participate in the program.

When will I see my new rate?

You can expect to see the new rate one to two billing cycles following your enrollment in the program.

Will my payments still be automatically deducted from my checking account as I do now?

Yes, how you pay the utility bill will not change.

Who do I call if I have a problem with my natural gas service and who will deliver my natural gas?

Your local utility will continue to be responsible for servicing your account and responding to any disruptions in service.

I already have a deregulated supplier; can I still join the aggregation?

The information provided by the utility indicated that you did not have a supplier. However, in some instances, there may be a delay in switching notices provided by the utility to suppliers. As such, you should check with your current supplier on your ability to terminate the agreement without incurring damages. You can always join the program at a later date, under the same terms and conditions.

Is there an early termination fee for leaving the program outside of the 21 day opt-out period?

No, there is no early termination fee for leaving the program at any point in time.

I am currently on budget billing, will that continue?

Yes, the utility will continue to provide you with a budget bill.

Service Agreement: The terms of the opt-out governmental aggregation program (the "Program") shall be pursuant to this Natural Gas Supply Agreement (hereinafter the "Agreement") entered into by Archer Energy, LLC (hereinafter "Archer") and the natural gas account holder of record (hereinafter "Client") and shall be effective beginning with the successful enrollment of Client's natural gas account with the Local Distribution Company ("LDC"), and continue through the June 2025 meter read and billing cycle. Client shall remain responsible for all fees incurred related to the consumption of natural gas during the term of this Agreement or any renewal term(s) regardless of when invoiced and whether invoiced by the LDC or Archer directly. Upon successful enrollment LDC terms dictate it may take 30-60 days before you receive your first bill with Archer as your supplier.

<u>Price:</u> During the term of this Agreement Archer will supply Client with natural gas supply at a fixed rate of \$0.5699 per Ccf, plus applicable taxes and exclusive of any applicable LDC charges, third party fees, and applicable taxes.

Eligibility: Residential and small commercial accounts with annual consumption of 5,000 Ccf or less that are not enrolled in Percentage of Income Plan Program are eligible. Participation in the Program is subject to the rules and regulations of the LDC and the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio ("PUCO"). Clients are sometimes terminated from the Program by error or by being in arrears; Client may contact the LDC to resolve the problem and be reinstated to the Program. Should Client fall into arrears during the term of this Agreement and subsequently become current, Archer may re-enroll Client for the remaining term of this Agreement. This Agreement is subject to Client acceptance into the program by both Archer and your LDC and this Agreement is not binding until such acceptance has been granted.

Renewal: If the Program continues beyond the initial Term of service, Archer will send you a notice of renewal including, but not limited to, notice of the new Program, notice of your right to opt-out and how to opt out, and a new supply Agreement, reflecting any other changes to the Program for any renewal period.

Opt-Out, Recission, & Cancellation: Client may decline this Agreement by opting-out the community aggregation. In order for Client to successfully opt-out, Archer must receive a valid opt-out notice during the opt-out period which shall be defined as twenty-one (21) days from the postmark date of the opt-out letter provided to Client. After the opt-out period expires, Client shall be enrolled with the LDC pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. After enrollment with the LDC, Client shall have a seven (7) day period whereby Client may Rescind the enrollment declining this Agreement by contacting the LDC within the recission period. After the recission period lapses, Client and Archer each shall have the right to terminate this Agreement at any time upon approximately 30 days advance notice which may be done so by either party without penalty or recourse except for any amounts for gas supply provided by Archer hereunder shall remain due in full regardless of when billed to Client. Upon Recission or Cancellation, Client shall bear the responsibility of arranging Gas Supply with an alternative third-party supplier or shall be returned to LDC supply offering(s). Client may incur switching fee(s) and may not be eligible for the same rate(s) as prior to enrollment with Archer. Client shall indemnify Archer for any Cancellation processing delays, additional supply charges incurred, switching fees, or lost opportunity cost related to arranging Gas Supply following Cancellation. This Agreement will automatically terminate if Client relocates outside of the Community, or their service is terminated by the LDC.

Billing & Payment: Client shall continue to be billed by the LDC pursuant to their preferred billing method; LDC bills will contain charges for Gas Supply and applicable taxes from Archer pursuant to this Agreement, as well as all applicable LDC charges and taxes. Client's first bill with Archer via the Program should be approximately 30-60 days following successful enrollment with the LDC. Client agrees to make timely payments to LDC for the full amount due pursuant to the payment terms and conditions offered by LDC. Failure to make timely payments may result in the removal of Client's service locations from Archer's supply pool resulting in Cancellation and/or LDC disconnection of service. Archer reserves the right to bill Client directly for any applicable charges owed pursuant to this Agreement or in the event LDC billing is not available. If Archer bills Client directly, such amounts will be due in full by the date indicated on the invoice to Client and Client shall make all efforts to make payment directly to Archer in a timely manner.

Amendment & Assignment: This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding of Archer and Client with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes, replaces, and cancels any and all similar Agreements or verbal communications between the parties hereto. No modification or amendment of this Agreement shall be binding on the parties unless in writing. Archer reserves the right to amend this Agreement pursuant to any Regulatory Event as defined below. This Agreement is only assignable by Archer which may be done so without Client consent or notification and is only subject to applicable regulatory approvals.

Regulatory: Third party natural gas supply is subject to change by the LDC and/or regulatory bodies that govern the jurisdiction of the service locations served under by this Agreement. If there is a change in law, administrative regulation, rule, structure, order, judicial decision, statute, or a change in an interpretation or application of any of the foregoing (collectively, a "Regulatory Event") and such Regulatory Event causes Archer to directly or indirectly incur any capital, operating, commodity or other costs (including, but not limited to increased taxes) relating to the provision of services contemplated herein in excess to those existing prior to the date of the Regulatory Event, then Archer shall be permitted to pass through the economic effects of such Event pro rata to Client.

Force Majeure: Force Majeure shall be defined as causes beyond the reasonable control of Archer, Client, and/or LDC that prevents Archer from performing under this Agreement. Such events include but are not limited to: acts of god, fire, flood, war, terrorism, sabotage, the declaration of an emergency by a governmental entity or LDC, interruption of natural gas distribution & supply, or any action taken by a third party that would impede Archer's ability to serve Client under this Agreement. In the event of a Force Majeure situation, Archer shall be relieved from any performance obligations until the situation is resolved.

Limitation of Liability: Archer shall not assume liability or responsibility for any special, indirect, consequential or punitive damages related to the failure of the LDC or any other party to perform its duties. This includes but is not limited to interruptions of service, service outages, termination of service, failure to provide service, or damages arising as a result of negligence. Archer provides no warranty of merchantability or fitness for a particular purpose or use. Client acknowledges and agrees that no warranty, duty or remedy, whether expressed, implied or statutory, is given or intended to arise out of this Agreement. The invalidity or unenforceability of any provisions of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision of this Agreement, which shall remain in full force and effect.

Miscellaneous: This Agreement shall continue after Cancellation or expiration as necessary for billing and payments related to the terms of this Agreement, limitations of liability as defined below and all other relevant terms. Archer shall have the right to set-off and net any amounts owed to Customer against any amounts owed to it by Customer under this Agreement or any other agreement. This Agreement is a "forward contract" and Archer is a "forward contract merchant under the U.S. Bankruptcy Code, as amended. If tax exempt, it shall be the responsibility of Client to provide Archer a copy of a valid exemption certificate from the applicable taxing authority.

Resolution: In the event of an emergency or if you smell gas, immediately contact the LDC at the number provided on your bill. In the event of a billing concern or dispute, Client is encouraged to first contact Archer's Customer Care Center to discuss the matter toll free at (844) 795-7491 M-F 9am-5pm. Concerns can also be provided via email to info@ArcherEnergy.com or in writing to 9777 Fairway Dr., Powell, OH 43065. If Archer is unable to resolve a concern, Client should contact the LDC at the number listed on their most recent bill or refer their concern to the Public Utilities Commission (PUCO) for assistance at (800) 686-7826 (toll free) or for TTY at (800) 686-1570 (toll free) from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00p.m. weekdays, or at www.puco.ohio.gov. Residential customers may also contact the Ohio Consumers' Counsel for assistance with disputes and/or utility issues at (877) 742-5622 (toll free) from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00p.m. weekdays, or at www.pickocc.org. If a suit is filed, any legal action involving this Agreement shall be brought only in a court of the State of Ohio and Client agrees not pursue any claims arising under this Agreement on a class or other representative basis and will not seek to coordinate or consolidate any legal actions arising under this Agreement with any other proceeding.

13 Waynesville Feat Is Astonishing Now

BY BOB MCNEHL Daily News State Editor

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WAYNESVILLE, Feb. 21. - This writer was astonished when Charles B. (Uncle Charlie) Lewis told of building the concrete highway from Waynesville a mile east to Corwin in 1913 at a cost of \$5000.

Perhaps the asionishment sprang from the fact that replacement of the strip in 1952-'53 is costing the state \$648,098.

Times have changed, but that isn't all, of course.

The replacement involved relocation of the route and placing the new strip of concrete on top of a huge earthen fill across the Little Miami river valley, building bridges across the river and over the Pennsylvania railroad and O'Neall rd., and curving the road around the Miami cemetery hill. It extends some 2.245 miles.

Anyway, state highway department engineers point out that they estimated the work would cost \$772,850 or \$124,752 above the suc-cessful bid submitted by D. R. Smalley and Sons of Celina.

"ROUTE 73 had to be closed so much because of high water in the winter and spring each year," said Julius R. Paxton of Middletown, division engineer, "that the project became a must. The detour route was 13 miles long."

Another difference in the two projects was the time needed to

The contract on the relocation allows the present contractor from early 1952 until Nov. 31, 1953, to complete the work. He probably will get the job done in the latter part of May. Thus, he will be ahead of schedule despite a setback last fall on delivery of steel for the river bridge and delay this winter when weather would not permit concrete laying on the exposed deck of the

bridge.
"The old road stood up for 40 years though we used only five sacks of cement to the yard and pit-run gravel," Lewis said. "Some of the present highway projects use seven sacks to the yard and washed gravel."

PAXTON CONFIRMED that the Route 73 built by Lewis appears on we had had to. the surface to be good.

"We built the old road 28 feet wide and 6 inches thick," Lewis said. "We 'caked it off' in sections about 30 feet long or made it a half-a-day's run." The new slab is 24 feet wide and 8 inches thick.

"We got through (using eight en aprons with concrete in a period of continuous flooding about 1914," Lewis recalled. "I told Mr. Robitzer when we first saw the flood, "Lucky we didn't have any more cement in."

Lewis and his crew worked against time and the flood waters putting up dirt embankments to protect a section of the dam at a time, finally getting 105 yards of concrete poured. The dam still stands.

"The biggest test of the Corwin road probably has come in the last four years since the highway was improved near Harveysburg eliminating the hairpin turn there," Lewis said. "Since then the big trucks between Middle-town, Waynesville, Wilmington and Washington C. H. have really been rolling over it."

A construction man explained that Lewis had good results with his work because we watched it very closely and knew the precise moment that it should be "worked." He said that he believed it was because "Uncle Charlie" took so much pride in his work.
