### **Council Report**

March 20, 2023 Chief Copeland

### Manager

• I have provided photos of our licensed Water Operator of Record doing water quality testing. We take village water bacteria samples monthly to be tested by the Dayton Lab and Supply Company and the reports are submitted to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The EPA has recently required a UCMR5 test that has to be done twice a year. We completed the UCMR5 test on March 14<sup>th</sup>, which includes a PFAS and lithium testing.

What is UCMR5? The fifth Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule (UCMR5) requires monitoring for 29 polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) compounds and a single metal analyte, Lithium. PFAS are a group of man-made chemicals that includes PFOA, PFOS, GenX and many others. These substances have been manufactured and used in a variety of industries across the globe, including the United States, since the 1940s. In addition, we did an independent test on March 13<sup>th</sup> with ETR Laboratories that included a vinyl chloride scan which is the contaminant at the East Palestine, Ohio spill and several other types of VOC's. We should receive all the test results by March 22<sup>nd</sup>. The village water comes from an aquifer that has been reported as one of the best sources in the state.



• The concrete fuel tank pad was formed, leveled, and poured on March 6<sup>th</sup> with a plumed power utility line. This will be the pad for the permanent gas and diesel tanks. I have researched our monthly usage over the past few months for both types of fuel. We are currently using between 450-500 gallons of gas per month, and we are using just under 100 gallons of diesel fuel per month. These numbers can vary for seasons. This research determined that two 1000-gallon tanks will be the most suitable for the Village. I would like to fill the gas tank, but only put 200 gallons of diesel in the tank and monitor the usage. This will keep the diesel from sitting for long periods of time. I will be researching double wall tanks and provide the information at the next Public Works meeting.









• The Maintenance Department worked on the exterior grounds of the Government Center. They pulled the dead shrubs, sprayed the weeds, and put decorative stone down. In addition, they installed parking blocks in the police lot.









• I sent a letter by certified mail on March 9<sup>th</sup> to Simone Derby, Tax Examiner Associate at the Division of Tax Equalization regarding applying for tax exemption on parcel # 06-31-377-033 which is the former Bowman property. She was advised that it has not been leased since the year 2021 and we are currently building a new well on that location. I spoke with County Auditor Matt Nolan and the property has been removed from the CAUV. I attached the required documentation with the request letter to assist with the exemption review.

- I have provided copies of the water and sewer rate survey prepared by the City of Piqua. The survey identifies the municipalities rates in 2022. The Village had a small increase in water rates, and we are still among the cheapest with some of the best water qualities in the state. The survey copies identify water rates, sewer rates, and a combination of both and we are below the median and average of all the municipalities that participated in this survey.
- Brian Keith and Stephen Koontz of the Village Water Department have been working on improving the disinfectant facility at the well field. They have been routinely changing the chlorination injector line and ends, servicing the pumps, and painting the interior of the pumping station.





### **Police**

- Northern Southern is providing a rail safety and emergency response training on April 18<sup>th</sup> thru 20<sup>th</sup> in 4-hour blocks from 8:30 am 12:30 pm or 1:30 pm 5:30 pm. The course is for first responders and will be at 1400 Gest Street, Cincinnati, Ohio. The course includes safety around railroads, understanding shipping documents, tank car identification, tank car valves and fittings, locomotive emergencies, responding to railroad emergencies, and AskRail mobile App.
- I had to re-register the Village in the opioid settlement. The class suit was formerly handled by Ohio One and in January 2023, they have elected to turn it over to Brown Greer PLC, 250 Rocketts Way, Richmond, Virginia 23231. I have been working with Case Manager Adrianne Bell at (888) 441-2010. The portal application has been completed and we are scheduled to receive disbursements of \$420.62.




